BOMBAY, India, March 25,-(P) Meher Baba, the Indian spiritual leader whose desciples call him "the messiah" and "the god-man" left here today for a new crusade in America.

He intends, he said, to break down all religious barriers, destroy America's materialism and amalgamate all creeds into a common element of

For eight years Meher Baba has been observing a vow of silence, which he said he would break upon his arrival at Harmon, N. Y., where he plans to establish a spiritual retreat similar to Mahatma Gandhi's in India.

Giving his first interview to an Associated Press correspondent by means of a blackboard, Meher Baba, who in the eyes of his followers has performed many miracles, said Gandhi had promised to come with him to the United States as soon as his political work has been finished a year hence. Many Indians regard Meher Baba
