

Famed Mystic in U.S. to End Long Silence

Meher Baba, Adviser of Gandhi, Arrives; Will Attend Retreat

New York, May 20—(Associated Press)—Shri Meher Baba, Indian mystic, has come to the land of talkies and loud speakers to break his seven years' silence. He maintained his vow as he arrived on the steamer Bremen from England yesterday by shutting a number of questions onto his English secretary, Quentin Ford. For such a personal communication as he saw fit to make, he was armed with a small blackboard on which were painted letters of the alphabet and numbers.

With him he brought a 4,000-word written statement. His secretary explained it was his message to America. In it Meher Baba proclaimed himself "one with the infinite source of everything."

"When I speak," the statement said, "my original message will be delivered to the world and it will have to be accepted."

Whether he will break his silence while at a retreat maintained by his followers at Harmon, N. Y., or await until he reaches California, his ultimate destination in this country, was not made plain.

He had no comment to take on the Indo-British situation and it was explained for him that when Mahatma Gandhi sought his teachings, he told Gandhi to quit politics.

His followers explained that "super-consciousness" was bestowed upon Meher Baba when he was a youth by the kiss of a parson woman saint, Hazrat Babian. After seven years another saint, Shri Sadgur Upanish, conferred "perfect sight" upon him and disciples began to flock to him.

This is not Meher Baba's first visit to America. He was here last October.

Extra Troops Called to End Bombay Riots

Fifteen New Deaths Reported in Hindu-Moslem Stabbing Affrays

Bombay, India, May 20—(Associated Press)—Governor Sykes today called out the Fifth Bombay Field Brigade, the Royal Artillery Auxiliary Force and the Bombay Light Horse, made up of non-official Europeans, to supplement the regular forces in dealing with the Hindu-Moslem riots.

Although there was less rioting today and a measurable return of confidence, the governor thought it necessary to call out the additional units as a precautionary measure.

Fifteen deaths were added to the total of more than 100 killed thus far in the rioting. Most of today's casualties were the result of stabbing affrays.

The Hindus attempted to burn a Moslem mosque in the mill area early in the day, but police prevented it and arrested 40 Hindus.

California's Deer Saved From Lions
Sacramento, Cal., May 20—(United Press)—California still has plenty of wild life—but not of the night-blooming variety.

It is estimated by the State Fish and Game Commission that there are 400,000 deer roaming the mountain ranges of the state.

The fact the state has maintained its deer population is attributed mainly to its fight against the mountain lion. It is estimated one mountain lion kills an average of one deer a week during his lifetime of approximately 12 years.

Last year hunters employed by the commission collected bounties on 232 lions, and already this year more than 300 of the "cats" have been killed.

M. I. T. Studies Action of Tiny Ocean Bubbles
Cambridge, Mass., May 20—(United Press)—Tiny bubbles, that form invisibly moving water and collapse with such tremendous force as to bend, popk, and melt the metal in ships' propellers and turbine blades are being studied at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The destructive bubbles, sometimes no larger than the head of a pin, often are compressed to a pressure of 14,000 pounds per square inch. It is hoped the studies will suggest more effective designs for hydraulic machinery.

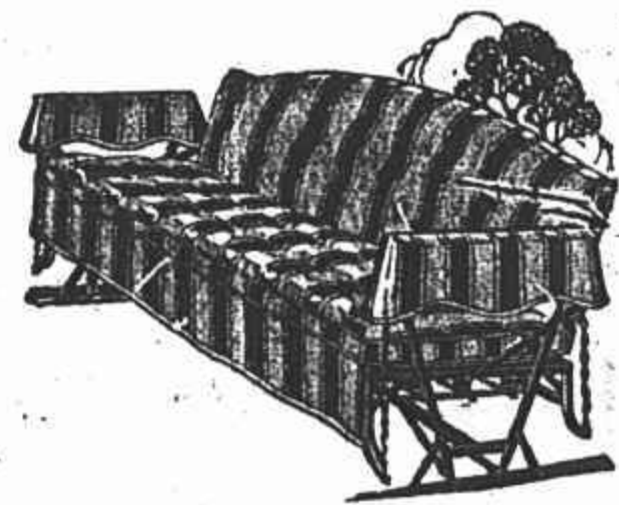

NEW COIL SPRING Porch Gliders

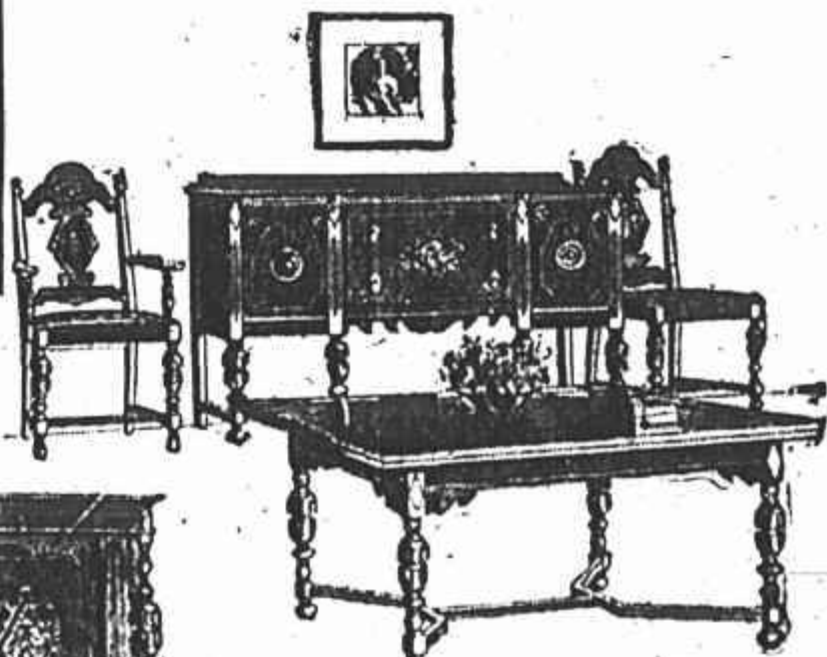

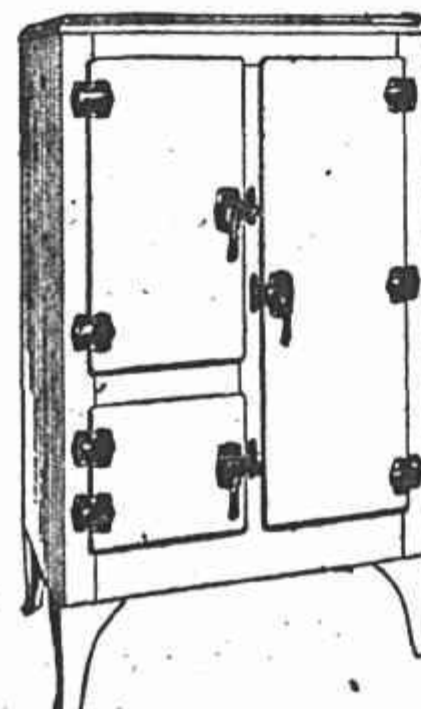
